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The table above clearly mirrors an overall picture in terms of the traveling's objectives of college students in a certain university. According to the data given above, we can conclude that the percentage of college students traveling for appreciating the scenery and relieving the pressure accounts for 37% and 33% respectively, ranking the first and the second one. At the same time, the percentage of undergraduates traveling for making friends, developing independence and other reasons accounts for 9% and 6% and 15% respectively.

All evidence mentioned above supports an unshakeable conclusion that traveling can benefit college students in various aspects. Just like the saying goes: You can either travel or read, but either your body or soul must be on the way.
